Finance Law

Major changes

New provisions of the 2023 finance law on foreign trade in Cameroon

Law No. 2022/020 of 27 December 2022 to lay down the finance law of the Republic of Cameroon for the year 2023 came into force on 1 January 2023. Some of the innovations of the new law are the introduction of new customs regulations that seek to encourage the local processing of goods in order to promote import substitution, increase customs duties on certain goods that are harmful to public health and the environment, and redefine the taxation method for imported mobile phones. Some of these customs innovations include:

A- MEASURES TO PROMOTE IMPORT SUBSTITUTION

• INCREASE OF CUSTOMS DUTIES AND TAXES ON THE EXPORT OF RAW MATERIALS (Section 10)

This State's decision to increase customs duties and taxes on raw materials is intended to toughen the conditions for the export of such materials in their raw state, thereby encouraging their local processing and the export of finished or manufactured products *«made in Cameroon»*. The measure comes to add up to the various customs duty reductions and tax breaks granted to the extractive sector by the 2022 Finance Law. Some of the amendments include:

- The increase of exit duties on wood log exports (from 50% to 60%);
- The increase of exit duties applicable to dressed and semi-dressed timber falling under tariff headings 4406, 4407 and 4409 (from 10% to 15%): This is to encourage 'advanced' wood processing, with a view to creating a local wood value chain;
- The increase of exit duties on the export of unprocessed cocoa beans (from 2% to 10%).
- INTRODUCTION OF AN EXCISE DUTY ON IMPORTS OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS AND EQUIPMENT SOLD ON THE LOCAL MARKET (Section 8)
- An excise duty of 25% on imports of cellulose paper and wadding or cellulose fibre webs used for domestic, sanitary or toilet purposes;
- An excise duty of 25% on imported articles and packaging made of cardboard and kraft paper, stoppers, caps and lids for bottles and other closing devices made of plastic and base metals; tubes and pipes and their fittings, plates, sheets, tapes and adhesives, whether or not in rolls, made of plastic materials;
- An excise duty of 12.5% on imports of mayonnaise, mustard and other tomato preparations or for sauces, soups, broths, mixed or homogenised condiments and seasoning, and food-grade ice;
- EXEMPTION FROM VAT ON THE PURCHASE OF PESTICIDES, FERTILIZERS AND INPUTS, AND ON CERTAIN AGRICULTURAL, FARMING AND FISHING EQUIPMENT (Section 122); (examples: planting, processing, packaging, irrigation, farming,

fishing and hatchery equipment, see Annexes to Part 1 of the General Tax Code.)

B- MEASURES TO PROTECT HEALTH AND THE ENVIRONMENT (Section 8)

By increasing taxes on alcohol and tobacco products, the Government intends to make these products less accessible to consumers, to fight against their abusive consumption and thus protect the health of the population. The measures taken include:

- The increase of excise duties from 30% to 50%, on imports of tobacco and manufactured tobacco substitutes, whether or not containing nicotine, intended for inhalation without combustion; other products containing nicotine intended to absorb nicotine in the body; preparations for electronic cigarettes and electric vaporisation devices; pipes, cigar and cigarette holders and their parts;
- The imposition of a 30% excise duty on imported malt beers, grape wines, vermouths, fermented beverages and other mixtures of fermented and nonfermented beverages.

C- METHODS FOR COLLECTING CUSTOMS DUTIES ON THE IMPORTATION OF MOBILE PHONES, TABLETS AND DIGITAL TERMINALS (Section 6)

For the purpose of amending the provisions of the 2019 Finance Law, the law provides for a new taxation regime for imported mobile phones and tablets. This implies that this taxation will no longer be done via a digital platform for the collection of communication credits from subscribers, but henceforth via the importer himself, who is required to declare and pay the Customs duties. On the other hand, the Finance Law provides for a 50% reduction on the taxable value of such imported equipment for a period of 24 months.

D- METHODS FOR COLLECTING AND RECOVERING CUSTOMS DUTIES AND TAXES RELATING TO THE EXECUTION OF PUBLIC CONTRACTS

In accordance with Article 7, public contracts will henceforth be concluded inclusive of all taxes, and subject to the customs duties and taxes in force. Any contract concluded exclusive of tax will not be opposable to the customs and tax administrations.

When concluding public contracts, authorising officers are required to ensure that the estimated amount of Customs duties and taxes are indicated where such contracts involve importation.

30 March



The CNSC participated at the Commonwealth Enterprise and Investment Council (CWEIC) in London, England, under the chairmanship of Lord Jonathan Peter Marland.

12-14 April



The CNSC and the African Export-Import Bank (AFREXIMBANK) signed a partnership agreement in favour of SMEs at the end of an international seminar themed «Optimising Opportunities Open to SMEs within the AfCFTA».

14 April
